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What is Semester at Sea?

- Established in 1963, Semester at Sea is the original shipboard education program for study abroad.
- The *MV Explorer* sails three academic voyages each year. Fall and spring itineraries take her around the globe to as many as 14 off-the-beaten path destinations.
- Undergraduates from universities around the world can transfer as many as 15 semester units back to their home campuses.
- The University of Virginia is the academic sponsor.
- Operated by the Institute for Shipboard Education, a 501 (c)3 non-profit.

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Mission:

The mission of Semester at Sea is to educate individuals for leadership, service, and success in shaping our interdependent world.

SAS combines academic excellence with challenging experiential programming to help today's scholars to develop a global perspective.

In an increasingly interdependent world, there is a vital need to advance the exchange of knowledge and understanding among cultures.

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Unparalleled Learning Experience:

- circumnavigate the globe in 100-110 days (up to 14 ports)

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SAS Itineraries Fall, spring, & summer Experiential learning SAS-sponsored field practica, many led by faculty for course credit

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A typical round-the-world itinerary: Fall and spring semesters: 100-110 days

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A typical summer itinerary: 65-70 days

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Courses:

Open to all majors from business to psychology to engineering to the performing arts In-country field work comprises 20 percent of grade for each course Transcripts are issued by the University of Virginia reflecting the letter grade earned. Credit is transferable just as if the student studied in Charlottesville for a semester.=

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Institute for Shipboard Education:

Since 1963, the non-profit Institute for Shipboard Education has operated Semester at Sea. Other ISE programs include parent trips (during SAS voyages), Enrichment Voyages, the Forum on Global Education, and SAS Alumni Reunion voyages.

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Parent Trips:

Parents of current voyagers may meet the ship in one of the ports-of-call during the voyage. Past parent trip destinations have included:

- Thailand
- Viet Nam
- Egypt
- Italy
- Turkey

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Enrichment Voyages:

Formerly known as Seminar at Sea, Enrichment Voyages are educational excursions to culturally rich and diverse destinations aboard the *MV Explorer*.

- 10-21 days
- Open to all ages
- Not for academic credit
- Panama Canal or Amazon itineraries

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Alumni Reunion Voyages:

- 1-2 times per year between the semesters
- Great opportunity for alumni to re-connect with their SAS experience and former shipmates
- Destinations like Cabo San Lucas and Turks & Caicos

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The Forum on Global Engagement:

This invitation-only event hosted by President Les McCabe and the ISE/SAS Board of Trustees is an opportunity for educational travel, dialogue, and exchange in the unique environment of the *MV Explorer* with international experts and thought leaders. Participants, who are invited to attend by the ISE/SAS President and Board of Trustees, include Semester at Sea alumni and friends spanning all levels of professional, academic, and international backgrounds. Forum on Global Engagement participants are selected for their potential discussion contributions, diversity of perspectives, and previous level of support and participation in Semester at Sea programs.

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Affording SAS:

ISE makes available \$4 million in financial aid annually. To be eligible, students do not necessarily need to qualify for standard forms of financial aid (such as Pell Grants) on their home campuses. Applicants are strongly encouraged to file the FAFSA and submit the Student Aid Report to ISE along with tax returns from the most recent tax year and any supplemental information that might be helpful in our review.

For thousands of students, financial aid has helped to make their Semester at Sea voyage a reality. Careful cabin category selection and strategic choices with the International Field Program options can help students keep costs down and maximize program affordability.
