

Participants must be at least 12 years old, 54" tall and comfortable riding a bike. Bike, helmet, gloves, rain jacket and souvenir water bottle are provided. Children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent/ guardian. The tour is not suitable for women who are pregnant. Natural sulfur gases may affect those with respiratory problems. You will not see molten lava. Tour content or itinerary may change due to weather conditions or volcanic activity.



Hit the Walmart, the farmer's market or Richardson's Beach park in the morning, lunch on ship and spend the afternoon getting IMMERSED in all things Hawaiian!

Not far from the pier, you will be met by local <u>Kupuna</u> (elders) at Wailoa River State Recreation Area. You will have a brief overview of the origins and

meanings behind the activities of the day before diving in with the elders to fully experience the Hawaiian culture. The first 2 hours will be spent learning hula, lei making and ukulele lessons. The second 2 hours will be spent doing some canoeing and playing some traditional <u>makahiki games</u>.

Conclude the day with an authentic Hawaiian dinner that will include kalua pork

(Hawaiian style pulled pork), laulau (pork wrapped in leaves/steamed), chicken long rice, steamed white rice, lomi salmon (tomato salmon salad) and haupia (coconut dessert). The entertainment will be local hula and Hawaiian music. Students may have the opportunity to join them in dancing and showing the dance that they learned during the day activities.



RAINFOREST ZIPLINE & WATERFALL ADVENTURE (4 sections)

Imagine yourself flying through a tropical rainforest canopy over gurgling streams and waterfalls with a view of the crystal blue Pacific Ocean in the distance! That's only the beginning on this amazing adventure that combines a seven-stage zip line course, a stroll through the famous World Botanical Gardens and viewings of two of Hawaii's most beautiful waterfalls in an exclusive area of the island. You are surrounded by beauty as you hike from one zip line to the next in this tropical wonderland. A portion of the hike

is on a suspension bridge that cuts through the jungle with several small waterfalls below your feet!

NOTE: Shorts that are at least knee length are recommended for comfort with harness straps. **Participants are <u>required</u> to have closed-toed shoes – no sandals.** We suggest glasses be secured for safety. **All long hair must be secured and dangling jewelry is prohibited**. This special adventure adheres to the safety standards set for Canopy Tours by ANSI Accredited Professional Ropes Course Association and all lines have received reviews and wet stamps by a Hawaii licensed and certified Professional Engineer and Structural Engineer. All zip line guides are fully trained and certified. Participants will be given all necessary safety equipment. Sunscreen, bug spray, and rain gear is provided.

RESTRICTIONS: Participants must be a minimum age of 10 and a minimum weight of 70lbs. Participants cannot exceed 270lbs. The tour operator reserves the right to weigh guests. **Participants under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent/guardian**. Participants should be able to walk short to medium distances on well-maintained trails, walk up approximately 40 trail stairs and have an adventurous attitude. The tour is not suitable for women who are pregnant. The tour may not be suitable for anyone with medical conditions, such as severe heart disease or back and neck problems. Tour itinerary may change due to severe weather but the zip line does operate rain or shine.

WATERFALL, CAVE & BLACK SAND COVE

This adventure takes you off the beaten path to explore remote treasures often unseen by the average traveler. Enjoy the scenic views of Rainbow Falls while taking in the rich rainforest surrounding the lookout. Travel by van to an area known as Boiling Pots where water from the Wailuku River rushes through old lava rocks and lava tubes creating a "boiling" effect.

Later, you have the option to navigate down 20 steep steps and over a natural trail to explore the mouth of Kaumana Caves. These natural wonders were formed by the 1881 eruption of Mauna Loa, the largest volcano in the world. Leaving the depths of the earth, we continue through Historic Hilo to the rugged coastline and a black sand cove. Relax by the water before heading back to the
