Impact Opportunities: offer unique cultural insights into the host country through people-to-people interaction, non-governmental organizations visits, homestays and/or service opportunities. A key component of reciprocity for our IMPACT programs is both monetary and in-kind donations to the organizations that we are privileged to visit. For our in-kind donations, we work with our partner organizations:



Global Grins: <u>Global Grins</u> supplies Semester at Sea with a supply of toothbrushes to be donated to the organizations (those that would like them) in the port countries that we visit.

One World Futbol: The <u>One World Play Project</u> created an ultra-durable, practically indestructible futbol (soccer ball) to bring the 'transformative power of play' to areas where a ball may be hard to come by. Semester at Sea IMPACT programs bring these balls to organizations working with youth development.

First Photo: Piloted on the Spring 2016 voyage, First Photo is a new initiative made possible by Spring 2013 Alum Perri Guzofsky. Her family's foundation graciously has donated to SAS to buy instant digital cameras for the IMPACT Programs. While Perri was voyaging with SAS she realized that to many people around the world a photo can be priceless, as very few people have access to photos of their family members and loved ones. This new initiative will provides cameras and film to the trip liaison or IMPACT scholar on field programs to take pictures of community members and children and give to them as a gift.

IMPACT: INVISIBLE TOURS (GROUPS A, B, & C)

Through the Volunteer4Greece organization, Semester at Sea has connected with Diogenes, an NGO committed to providing support to the most vulnerable members of our society. They do this through two primary activities: 1) Shedia street paper is a unique publication with specific job opportunities for people experiencing poverty, homelessness and long-term unemployment; and 2) "Invisible Tours" is a city tour program in the center of Athens which contains some of the most important social institutions (soup kitchens, homeless shelters,

rehabilitation programs etc.). Tour guides are street paper's official vendors which were -or still are - homeless. Through the tour, the guides share information about the provided services by the institutions but also, they narrate stories about their personal experience of living in the streets which serves to break down barriers of stigma and promote humanity, solidarity and compassion. Professor Jeanne Ballantine will help participants connect this experience to the themes in the Global Studies course.

The basic goal of the tours is to energize the person-guide. To create chances to support themselves and to make one more step to the social re-integration. It is also of the same importance to listen to personal stories and gain mutual understanding. Understanding is the beginning of change.

"This will provide a look at the Greece most visitors will never see, and add a new dimension to your experience that is related to Global Studies." - Prof. Ballantine

*Half of the 6 € tour participation fee (roundtrip transportation from the ship makes up the majority of program cost) is direct income for the guide. The remaining 50% is for the street paper's operating expenses, training, media communication and taxes. If there is any unused balance, it will be used for the needs of the campaign "Kick Out Poverty" and the Greek National Homeless Football Team.

A short 15 minute bus ride will take students to a local high school where you will meet local Italian students, share a little about life on the ship (the first couple weeks, anyway) and learn about school in Italy. After this exchange, each SASer will be paired with a local student (18-year-olds in their final year of school) and go with

them to their home for the afternoon. The families will host you for lunch and welcome you into their home for some fun. This is what SAS is all about. Don't miss this great opportunity to meet an Italian family, pick up some Italian phrases and make some new friends.

Transportation to the homes will be provided by the host families in private cars. They will be driven ONLY by licensed host **parents** who have been screened by the school. Time in cars will not be more than 2 miles in either direction. After lunch, some students might, at their own expense, take the train to Santa Marinella that is a village 5 miles away from Civitavecchia. Students will be escorted by the hosts back to the Port Shuttle stop to return to the ship.

Yes, this is just what it sounds like – usually part of <u>La Merce</u> Festival in Barcelona, this unique Catalonian tradition called "*Correfoc*" brings sparklers, drums, music, and dancing together is an exciting celebration. Even though our port call doesn't quite coincide with the festival, voyagers can still experience the excitement with this full recreation in the Spanish Village.

You will experience how a group of villagers from all ages ("Colla de Diables), dressed like devils and percussionists, will turn the Spanish village into a fiery cauldron of light and fireworks. It all represents the fight of the Good against the Evil. The experienced local guide will show the outfits and special clothes "devils" wear during their performance and will explain secrets and details behind this tradition; which is strongly connected to the history of the town.

You can take it all in from the side lines or get involved and run with fire sticks the same way a local does. Whether you dance with the devils between the crowds, or just watch the spectacle of fire as an observer, it will be a real and unforgettable experience either way!



IMPACT: HIDDEN TOUR (NEW!)

Barcelona continues to flourish as a major tourist destination, now being the fourth most visited city in Europe. However, like many other cities, it has had its share of challenges with homelessness. The folks at <u>Hidden</u> <u>City Tours</u> saw an opportunity to use one of Barcelona's greatest strengths – its tourism industry – to **spark change for the city's homeless population**. By offering employment as tour guides to individuals dealing with homelessness, Hidden City Tours provides meaningful work and a way to a better life.

Hidden City's guides are recruited from social services, soup kitchens, and charities, and then coached and trained to show travelers a side of Barcelona rarely found in a guidebook. Who best to show you around the streets of Barcelona than someone who has lived there? Each guide has a unique story, deep knowledge of the city, and can't wait to take you to the touristy - and not so touristy - areas and share Barcelona's hidden secrets.

After your guided tour of the city, enjoy some light **tapas** prepared by the chefs at a local soup kitchen, **Chiringuito de Dios** (God's Beach Bar), while learning a bit more about its mission and involvement in the local community (Chiringuito's primary function is as a soup kitchen but offers tapas service subject to availability).

A dynamic discussion with university

students will serve as an introduction into Moroccan culture. Your home for three nights will be with a local family in Amizmiz, a Berber village. SAS students will be placed in groups of two, three, and four with families that have at least one English-speaking family member. Experience rural village life with visits to local artisan cooperatives, possibly a Moroccan school, and through a soccer game with the village kids. Try Moroccan cuisines and maybe even cook with your host family; learn to eat using bread as your utensil – right hand only, please!

The group will hike through rural villages in the foothills of the Atlas Mountains, where homes only recently received

access to running water or electricity. Join host siblings for an optional visit to a traditional Moroccan bath, known as a Hammam (gender separated, these "Turkish" baths are an exhilarating, exfoliating experience – underwear and bikini tops are acceptable but not required.) Celebrate new relationships with a traditional Moroccan party featuring music and dance. On the final day, say good-bye to host families and then take a 10 minute camel ride to a local lake, gazing upon the Atlas Mountains in the distance. This trip wraps up with lunch and shopping time in Marrakech's Jema el-Fnaa Square and the surrounding markets. Return with Moroccan souvenirs and a new perspective on Morocco and the Middle East.

<u>Tostan</u>, meaning 'breakthrough' in Wolof, is a successful **human rights NGO** headquartered in Dakar. Through its grass-roots Community Empowerment Program, Tostan addresses issues of education, health, environment, governance, and economic growth in ways that are sustainable, inclusive, and human-rights based.

An extremely special field class in 2015 has been

children and their teachers. We end our afternoon with a visit at the **Steve Biko Institute**, a pioneering educational institute focused on

preparing students for the all-important vestibular, or matriculation, exam that allows entrance to third level education in Brazil.

Brazil boasts some of the best universities in Latin America, but passing the country's tough university entrance exam, the vestibular, is not an option for most black Brazilians. In Bahia, 70% of the population is of African descent, but more than 80% of those who graduate from university are white, clearly a situation of exclusion. The poor quality of state primary and secondary schools means black students end up with only a remote chance of passing the vestibular. Many white students grow up in the private school system, and can also afford expensive one-year courses that prepare them for the exam. Paradoxically, it is mostly these students who secure the coveted places in Brazil's federal universities, which are funded by the federal government and charge no fee. This paradox is widely seen as the root cause for so much of Brazil's inequalities.

Our objectives for these visits are to learn about how the children from under privileged backgrounds are educated and to gain insight into their feelings regarding links between education and the challenges and triumphs of dealing with urban poverty and development.

After lunch we will continue to our host families in the local community. We will spend the afternoon with the family, learning about their lifestyle and joining them in daily activities. At night we will have a dinner all together in the community, joined by local musicians who will be playing the Andean folklore.

Day 3: This morning we drive to the picturesque crater lake of Cuicocha in the Cotacachi-Cayapas. We will hike partly around the crater to several vantage points offering the best views over this natural highlight of the region.



After a box lunch, we will make our way towards Ouito. enroute we will visit the Equator Line. Ciudad Mitad del Mundo, or City in the Middle of the World, is located just 25km/16mi north of Quito's center. Next door is the private Inti Nan Solar, or Path of the Sun museum. It is dedicated to the ancestral worldview of various ethnic groups. Physics experiments explain gravitational effects on the equator. Try yourself balancing an egg on the head of a nail or miraculously lose your strength on the magnetic line! Afterwards we continue to Ouito, where you will have free time for dinner on your own.

Day 4: Today we explore the capital city of Quito, beginning with the

traditional bakery & pastry shop of San Juan. You can learn more about the baking of local delicacies such as quesadillas (sweet cheese pastries), chimborazos, suspiros (meringues) and others! We will then see Plaza San Francisco - a regional market since pre-Columbian times, La Ronda - perhaps the most representative street of the historical center, and the Plaza del Teatro where we will enjoy lunch next to the Sucre Theatre. After lunch we're off to the slopes of the Pichincha volcano, where we will enjoy the ride by Cable car, or 'Teleferico', to an altitude of 4100m/13500 ft. where we will admire the expansive city of Quito, as and surrounding volcanoes. Afterwards we will transfer to the airport for our flight back to Guayaguil.

IMPACT

Spend 3 days working alongside full-time Sea Turtle researchers at **Ostional beach**, an important nesting beach for three of the world's seven species of sea turtles. Do your part to help save these rapidly declining species. According to the World Conservation Union (UICN) Red List, two of the three (Eastern Pacific leatherback and Green Sea turtles) are currently in danger of extinction. There is clearly an urgent need of

conservation to safe-guard these populations, however without data that provides knowledge of their biology it is difficult to frame appropriate management strategies. It is hoped that long term monitoring will yield data on nesting females and their nests to enable the formulation of management alternatives that can be put into practice at this beach.

Participants do not need any prior experience working with sea turtles as full training will be provided upon arrival to the project site. We appreciate people who use their initiative, are problem solvers, look to be useful in their spare time,

Accommodations

Participants will stay with local families (at least 2 participants per family) during their time on the project. The accommodations are within the community of Ostional, which is located right in front of the nesting beach. Typical homes in the community are small and basic (but comfortable), normally consisting of two or three bedrooms, a kitchen, living room, and bathroom. Do not expect to have hot running water in the kitchen or bathroom (including the shower). However, do keep in mind that the climate will be hot and humid, so a cool shower will usually be welcome!

Please note that the local families speak **little or no English**, so a Spanish dictionary and a little practice will be very helpful. Every effort you make to communicate with locals in Spanish, no matter how few words you can speak, or how poor your grammar may be, will be greatly appreciated by your hosts. IMPACT: TURTLE CONSERVATION RESEARCH

3DAYS/2NIGHTS

We are unable to provide a daily itinerary, however over the 3 days, aactivities will include SOME of the following:

(It is important to note that students should be flexible as the specific activities are weather and turtle dependent)

- Night beach patrols (to collect data, tag them, counting eggs)
- Assisting in the collection of biometric data from nesting turtles & hatchlings
- Assisting in the relocation of nests
- Day/night hatchery duties
- Nest monitoring
- Hatchling liberation
- Beach clean-up (to remove debris that impedes hatchlings)
- Construction of a beach hatchery

Mandatory Packing List:

- Lightweight, quick dry, black, long-sleeved shirt and pants, for patrolling at night. Sea turtles are photosensitive and can be easily disturbed by lights or light colours. Some animals are very sensitive and will abort nesting and return to the water if disturbed. For this reason only dark clothing can be worn on patrols. The project will be selling dark long-sleeve shirts (with the project logo and a Leatherback image on the back), to support the project and carry on our research.
- **Flashlight/headlight** with RED LED filter usually the cheapest ones feature exactly that.
- <u>Closed-toed</u> shoes that can get wet (crocs, aqua shoes, old sneakers or walking boots, etc.)
