COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces the reporting, writing, and interview skills that are the basis for good journalism. Students will master basic newswriting techniques; study examples of journalism in our port countries and the U.S.; and produce articles for posting on a class blog.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

In class, students will learn and practice the news production process, which includes data collection, organization, revision, documentation, and presentation. Discussions will cover the nature of news; the difference between news and feature writing; credible sourcing; lead writing and the inverted pyramid organizational model; quotations and attribution; and interviewing skills. In ports and at sea, students will do the reporting and research necessary to produce four different types of stories—event, interview, issue, and profile—for a total of seven stories. In addition, students will produce stories on deadline during class on at least three occasions. Outstanding stories will be published on the class blog.

Assigned stories will address both happenings on board ship and upcoming ports in the form of tips, news, and interviews with faculty, students, administrators, and interport lecturers—an activity which will significantly enhance students' experience of ports. Short readings in the required textbook, generally less than 5 pages each, will frame classroom discussions.

But the focus of the course is the acquisition of newswriting skills—reporting, writing, and interviewing. As such, participation in class discussions and activates, and timely completion of writing assignments are the keys to success in this class. The pace will be quick and over the semester students will submit 10 new stories of between 250 and 500 words (one to two full, double-spaced pages). Students must rewrite and resubmit at least two of these stories.

WORK

Experiential course work on Semester at Sea is comprised of the required field lab led by your instructor and additional field assignments that span multiple ports.

FIELD LAB (At least 20 percent of the contact hours for each course, to be led by the instructor.)

Field lab attendance is mandatory for all students enrolled in this course. Do not book individual travel plans or a Semester at Sea sponsored trip on the day of your field lab.

The field lab for this course takes place on: Thursday, March 3 in Kochin, India.

River Cruise in India—Tour the Kerala Backwater by Boat. Observe Details along the way. We will stop at least twice where students will do interviews and take photos for a story. Part of the challenge will be finding English speakers. Write either a profile of someone you meet or a travel piece on the river cruise.

FIELD ASSIGNMENTS

The field assignment will be the basis for the final 750 word story. Students will incorporate all of the techniques learned in the course and use interviews done during the field lab.

METHODS OF EVALUATION / GRADING RUBRIC

There is a final 750-word writing assignment based on the field lab but no mid-term or final exam. Methods of evaluation consist of:

writing assignments (60%); reading quizzes (10%); class participation (10%) field lab and assignment (20%).
